FULL AND FAIR FUNDING OF OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS RESOLUTION

COUNCIL FILE #19-0002-S12

City Council member Joe Buscaino has submitted the above-referenced resolution calling for Full and Fair Funding of our public schools. Council Members Mike Bonin and Marqueece Harris-Dawson seconded it. Among others, the California School Boards Association has gained similar adoption by the 31st District PTA, the California State Democratic Party, and most school districts in the State. The resolution was referred to the Rules, Elections and Inter-Governmental Relations Committee chaired by Council President Herb Wesson. That body meets next on the 3rd Friday of the month (2/15/19) at 9am. Assuming it passes out of there, it will then go back to the full body for adoption. this is the link to the City Clerk's tracking

MOTION:

THE WESTWOOD NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL ADOPTS THE FULL AND FAIR FUNDING RESOLUTION (COUNCIL FILE #19-0002-S12) AND URGES THE ENTIRE LOS ANGELES CITY COUNCIL TO ADOPT SAME:

WHEREAS, any official position of the City of Los Angeles with respect to legislation, rules, regulations or policies proposed to or pending before a local, state or federal governmental body or agency must first have been adopted in the form of a Resolution by the City Council with the concurrence of the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, California has the fifth largest economy in the world, and the largest Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of any state in the nation; and

WHEREAS, despite California's leadership in the global economy, the state falls in the nation's bottom quintile on nearly every measure of public K-12 school funding and school staffing; and

WHEREAS, California ranks 45th nationally in the percentage of taxable income spent on education, 41st in per-pupil funding, 45th in pupil-teacher ratios and 48th in pupilstaff ratios; and

WHEREAS, K-12 school funding has not substantially increased, adjusting for inflation, for more than a decade; and WHEREAS, under the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), state funding for K-12 schools has only this recently returned to levels predating the Great Recession of 2007; and

WHEREAS, the modest revenue increases since the implementation of LCFF have been eroded by rapidly increasing costs for health care, pensions, transportation and utilities; and

WHEREAS, California funds schools at roughly \$1,961 per student less than the national average, which translates to approximately \$3,462 per student when adjusted for California being a high-cost state; and WHEREAS, California trails the average of the top 10 states by almost \$7,000 in per-pupil funding; and

WHEREAS, to close opportunity and achievement gaps and create a public school system that offers consistently high levels of education, the State must provide appropriate resources to meet student need;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by the adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2019-20 State Legislative Program SUPPORT for any legislative or administrative action that would fund California public schools at the national average or higher by the year 2020, and at a level that is equal to or above the average of the top 10 states nationally by 2025 and to maintain, at a minimum, this level of funding until otherwise decreed.
